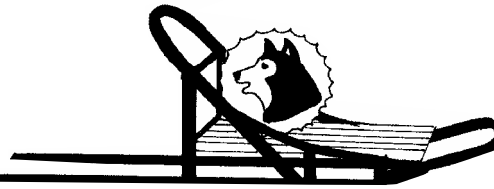

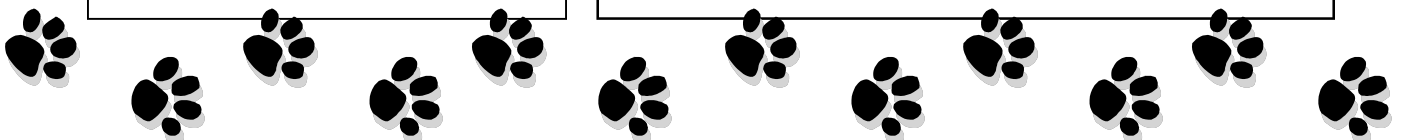

KENNEL MANAGEMENT

We all love dogs right? After all, isn't that the biggest reason for getting involved in this sport? But how many dogs are too many? And if you have too many dogs, what then? The first thing you must do is prevent any future litters. How can you do that? By separating your males from your females and keeping them separated, by whatever means necessary; even if that means having two separate dog yards, one for males and one for females. This is the most successful way to prevent accidental Breedings. Another alternative is to have your dogs on tie-outs with intact females next to intact females or neutered males. Unfortunately there are no guarantees that chains will not break, snaps will not give way and collars will not be chewed. If your dog yard is open with no perimeter fence, you are also leaving your females vulnerable to stray dogs. If an unwanted breeding occurs there is a shot that can be administered to the female to prevent pregnancy. This shot is only effective if given with the first 24 to 48 hours post breeding. Therefore, it is much more desirable to prevent unwanted breeding in the first place.

The second thing is getting your dogs spayed and/or neutered. Too expensive you say? There are many programs available for low-cost spay and neuter. Each spring there is an organization, Concerned People For Animals, that make funds available to several animal clinics in Northern Idaho. They usually advertise in the pet section of the Nickels Worth and through that program you can get your dogs neutered for around \$30. You could also talk with your personal vet and ask about a reduced rate. There are a number of health benefits from spaying and neutering. Think your dog will slow down, lose his/her drive? That is just not true.

The question has been raised on SDC Talk regarding the cost of raising one puppy for a year and it seems the average was \$250.00 per puppy (providing you have healthy puppies, do your own vaccinations, dew claws and deworming yourself). Basically if you have a litter of six puppies it

will cost you, on average, \$1500.00 to raise that litter for the first year of its life. And there are no guarantees that every puppy in that litter will grow up to be an awesome sled dog or even a mediocre sled dog.

How do you know if you have too many dogs? Here are some questions to ask yourself. Can you afford to feed them all a high quality food? Performance dogs are only as good as the food you put into them. Can you provide them with shelter for summer and winter? Good dog houses with straw or shavings? And what about vet care? Can you afford vaccinations, worm medicine, an adequate first aid kit? And what about vet visits for major illness or injuries. Have dogs long enough and everyone will experience their share of these. Ideally we should all have a savings account set up strictly for those unexpected emergency veterinarian visits. to the dogs you have? They all need socialization, exercise, affection and they need all these things 365 days a year.

So you decide you have too many dogs, what now? Make a list of the dogs you absolutely have to keep for your goals. Make another list of the dogs that would be a good addition to another mushers dog yard and do your best to place them, give them away if necessary. Make another list of the dogs you think would make good pets, definitely give them away, but do so responsibly. By that I mean providing honest information to the new owners so they are fully aware of what they are getting into. The last list is definitely the hardest, this is the euthanasia list. If you have older dogs that are having difficulty getting around, dogs that need regular medication, are ill, deformed, have behavioral issues making them unsuitable pets or have a general failure to thrive, have them put down. This may be hard but will be the best thing for you and the dog.

If you would like further information on kennel management, go to www.mushwithpride.org. If you are in a situation where you are feeling overwhelmed and need help, please ask. The largest dog yard is not necessarily the best dog yard with the best dogs.

Dog Food Prices, Why are they Going up Up UP?

Food prices for both ourselves and our canine companions are on the rise, precipitous in some cases. We see this every time we go to the feed store, call our distributor or go to the grocery store. The factors involved are complex and global in nature. The following is from an article by Alex Renton from "The Guardian" a UK publication.

The first factor affecting food price is the price of oil. In January 2008, oil prices hit \$100.00 a barrel. That means that food is four times as expensive to plant, irrigate, harvest and transport as it was six years ago. While meat is a key ingredient in dog food, grains are as well, and cattle, chicken, poultry etc eat grain.

The second factor is climate. Drought, hurricanes and floods around the world last year

led to terrible harvests from Australia to the Caribbean and the United Kingdom. This is one of the factors that has led to increasing price for grain.

The third factor is the massive rise in the price of staple food commodities: wheat, corn and soy. This has been driven by speculation in the markets, partly by the demand for crops to turn into fuel. In the US vast tracts of farmland now are in corn for ethanol production.

The fourth factor is the economic boom in China and India. Around the world and through history people have eaten more meat as they have become richer. This is called the nutrition transition and its now happening very quickly, in the two most populous nations on the planet. Hundreds of millions of people are now rich enough to eat meat compared to 10 years ago. ... *The Ed...*

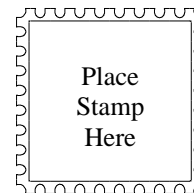
