A View of the Mushing Mindset And Sled Dog Lifestyle

Can we really interpret the mushing mindset? Is it possible to apply true definition to the obsession that drives many of us each day out into the cold and frozen world of sled dogs? There are many explanations, which might actually be called excuses that allow us as mushers permission to indulge the lifestyle we crave, stretching the logical limits of practical behavior far beyond the realm of normalcy. To the uninitiated we appear as people on the fringe, a step out of line, possibly even slightly demented! In our world "normal human behavior" is somewhat convoluted. Call us crazy if you want, but we are fortunate enough to be immersed in the daily routine of kennel life.

The tangibles such as the adoring howls of welcome from our dogs when we enter the kennel or the cold crisp air on our faces during fall training stay in our minds all year long, lending credence to our self-preserving mindset allowing us to continue on the course we have chosen for ourselves. The intangibles of driving a dog team are a large part of the reason we, season after season persevere through the day to day balance of work, family and dog yard chores. Trying to explain the feeling we get when out on the trail is impossible, fruitless. Words won't suffice. The depth of it is too much, too large and the written or spoken word falls far short of the description necessary to give justice to that feeling imprinted in our brain. Sure, we can try, but success will be far from our reach.

There are those of us who have been at this mushing thing for quite a while, and in turn we feel confident, secure, sure of our actions, which over time have become second nature to us. Completely at home hooking up and heading down the trail, comfortable behind the handlebar of the sled, balanced on the runners. Yet, intensely enthused at the prospect of the upcoming run. Even we, who are totally at home in this venue are at best tongue tied when asked to put words to the whole thing!

The newly initiated to this life of dogs may be the ones coming closest to being able to verbalize this feeling as they have not yet been wrapped up in length and breadth of the whole experience. Their vision is enhanced by the first blush of excitement, heightened by the first rush of exposure to the trail! Their journey has just begun.

We train and race for the love of that feeling, for the love of the dogs and for the freedom that we achieve while doing so. Seeing all those canine eyes turn to us with trust and eager looks, as they know they are about to do the one thing they were born to do, run. Watching a team come together, working as one never fails to impress, even those who have been at it for years will be hard put to disagree that all the hard work, daily care and training can fall into place in a heartbeat. Making all the bad hook-ups, bad runs, rain, mud, ice and cold disappear in an instant. That perfect run.

And as we all know you have to hold strong, eyes forward, mind focused on the goal ahead. And it surely is not an easy thing, the mind and body tire and the spirit can falter. But, we keep doing it anyway, sometimes not even knowing why, until that one magical run where the slacker kicks in or that special potential leader steps up to the task. We have all been there, we know the feeling when we reach and

surpass a milestone we have set for our team and ourselves, but we will struggle to accurately vocalize the intensity of the moment taking place in our heart and mind. The best we can say is that we have accomplished what we set out to do. That we are lucky enough to live the sled dog lifestyle.

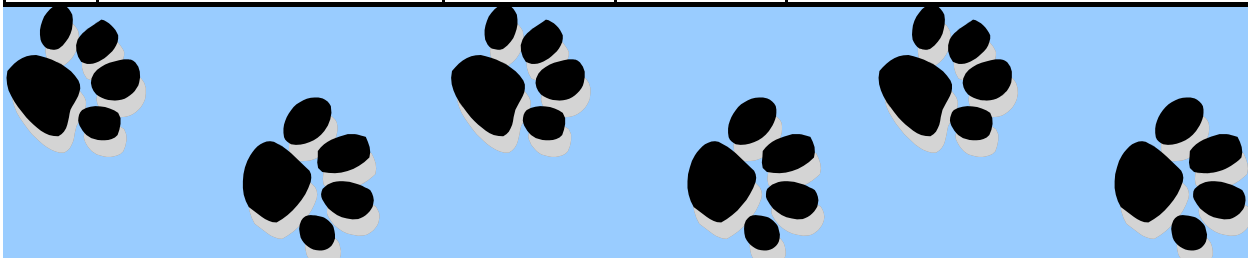

Members Present: Jeanne Arnold (chair), Judy Cowan, Bob & Donna Daymude, Bruce Hagstrom, Richard Hancock, Brendia Heintzelman, Jim & Susie Malcolm, Tom Palmer, Jill & Bob Wilson, Ann & Bob Yanecek.

Meeting called to order at 7:15 PM.

Minutes: Jill/Donna moved that the minutes from the previous meeting be accepted as written. Passed.

I. Priest Lake Race

- a. **Permit** - Wendy has applied for a site permit with the US Forest Service.
- b. **Cushmans** - Bob D. reported that he does have his trailer and it is available to transport both of the Cushmans. He will take it over to the Heintzelman's this coming weekend. Tom Palmer reported our Cushman needs a new belt.
- c. **Grooming** - Tom requested that the club buy new tires for the groomers. Jeanne gave the OK to purchase. We need to start grooming the Saturday prior to the race, this is the earliest we are allowed on the trails. Ann will contact the FS to see if we can park the trailer for the Cushmans there during the week. Grooming will commence Sat. Jan 29 around 10:00 am. Bob & Jill will bring their snowmobile.
- d. **Timing** - Richard has computer program and display for race times that he was able to try out at Frog Lake and Chemult. There are still a couple of minor computer bugs in the program. Ann will have them fixed for the race.
- e. **Canopies** - We need at least 3 canopies for the race, one for the info/sales booth, one for the timer, and one for the computer display. Jeanne, Bob & Jill, and Ann & Bob each volunteered to bring one.
- f. **Generator** - Richard has one he will bring to run the computer.
- g. **Tables** - Jeanne asked people to bring any tables they have that can be used outdoors.
- h. **Plowing the parking lot** - Brendia reported that she put a cap on the cost of plowing at \$1,200 and she is making arrangements.
- i. **Port-a-Potties** - Brendia has these taken care of.
- j. **Food concession** - Brendia has lined up the same vendor as last year.
- k. **Race Booklet** - Bob reported on the progress of the race booklet that Petroglyph Printing has agreed to do for us. Brendia requested that 300 copies will be needed, up 100 from last time so we have some to give to Hill's and Elkin's resorts.

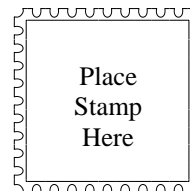
